

Mayor's Address

to the City of Bethlehem



As we get ready to enter the autumn season, we reflect on the culmination of a significant event that has

taken over 22 years to come to fruition. Through the hard work and dedication of community leaders and institutional partners, the prestigious UNESCO World Heritage designation for the Moravian sites in Bethlehem was awarded to us in New Delhi, India, on Friday, July 26. Historical Moravian Church Settlements, a single transnational World Heritage site that represents the worldwide influence of the Moravian Church, includes Herrnhut (Germany), Gracehill (United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland), Christiansfeld (Denmark), and, of course, Bethlehem. While the universal value of these historic settlements and the worldwide influence of the Moravian Church are now officially recognized and we find ourselves diligently preparing for what it will mean for our local tourism and economic impact, we also know that we do this in context of our diverse and expanding community.

Whether your family has been here for generations or you have been our neighbor for only a few years, Bethlehem is your home. It is why people have described the feeling of moving and working here as "a warm embrace" - because our residents and community partners prioritize including others in creative projects and business endeavors, and volunteering their time, talents, and resources to helping others. Pursuing the World Heritage designation is a way to honor the incredible contributions of the Moravians to our community. Equally as important, however, is looking at how the spirit of those contributions will shape our motivations in the months and years to come.

Rev. Janel Rice emphasized this idea at Central Moravian Church's World Heritage inspired service on Sunday, August 4. She stated, "At the heart of Bethlehem, and at Whether your family has been here for generations or you have been our neighbor for only a few years, Bethlehem is your home.

the heart of the Moravian Church, what we are striving and continuing to be, are builders and sustainers of community." While the buildings and property of the Moravian Church Settlements - Bethlehem site are to be protected and celebrated, we must also continue to ask ourselves how we prioritize this among other growing needs in our community: shelter and affordable housing, food access, mental health challenges, child care needs and care for income-burdened and aging communities. It's been almost 300 years since the Moravians first settled in Bethlehem and we know that values like equity, plainly evident in places like "God's Acre," are not unique to the Moravians. Values like fairness and equality are values we all share, and those values can look different depending on each neighborhood in our city, with its own stories, faiths, cultures and needs.



The work for us is just beginning. We are hosting a Transnational Inscription Event from October 15 – October 18, when we will welcome government officials and delegates from our international partners. In spring of 2025, we are planning a wider community celebration — for everyone. Upholding the ideals of the Moravians, of the world leaders who awarded us this designation, is something that will be owned by all of our community. We hope the celebration will inspire us to live up to the ideals of humanity that are at the center of our inscription as a World Heritage site.

There are so many people and institutions to thank for our incredible World Heritage designation. Charlene Donchez Mowers,

former Executive Director of Historic Bethlehem Museums and Sites and current World Heritage Senior Advisor and Historian, began our work over two decades ago and has led the effort every step of the way with a professionalism and dedication second to none. Our World Heritage Vice Chairman, Hank Barnette, has also dedicated years of his civic life to seeing our dream of a nomination become a reality. We, of course, also must mention our World Heritage Council institutions – the Bethlehem Area Moravians, Central Moravian Church, Historic Bethlehem Museum and Sites, Moravian University and Northampton County, which joined the City of Bethlehem in providing the backbone of our successful journey.

We also must remember the late Bishop Hopeton Clennon. Hopeton's leadership was instrumental in guiding this World Heritage process. Humility, honor, respect and community were his personal principles that guided our conversations and steps in a way that was deeply rooted in compassion and generosity. Hopeton's spirit is one that we continue to embody as we are faced with the joys and challenges that will come next.

The Moravian Church has historically been guided by these words: "In essentials, unity; in nonessentials, liberty; and in all things, love." We don't – and shouldn't – pick and choose who is worthy of that love. In sustaining and building our community, we must ask ourselves what this love looks like in action, with all of us at the table. The world recognized our community for embodying the best qualities of humanity. Now, it is our responsibility for all 78,000 of us to show the world the values that the Moravians brought to our community and have defined us for almost 300 years. We can't wait.

The Bethlehem Service Center (BSC) is available for residents to contact for non-emergencies 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year.

There are four ways to contact the BSC for non-emergencies.

Remember, in the event of any type of emergency, DIAL 911.

- 1. Call 610-865-7000. This number can be reached by house phone line or by cell phone. This will dial directly into the BSC for non-emergency questions/city inquiries or city services.
- 2. Bethlehem Service Center App: The app is available to download for most cell phones and tablets on either the Play Store or the App Store on your device. Search for "Bethlehem Service Center" or "City of Bethlehem" under Apps, or scan the QR code to the right. Access key information at your fingertips with this easy-to-use mobile application. Receive emergency notifications, submit a service request, find out what to do in Bethlehem, find parking, view bus schedules, pay your bills and much more.
- 3. Email: The BSC can also be reached via email at bethlehemservicecenter@bethlehem-pa.gov.
- 4. City of Bethlehem Web Page and Portal: Visit bethlehem-pa.gov, click "Online Services" in the main menu, then click "My Account." Here, you will be able to submit a service request.

Examples of "non-emergency" customer service: dirty water, potholes that need to be repaired, debris in the street, recycling issues, etc. The BSC will also provide assistance to any City of Bethlehem residents who may have questions or concerns that need to be addressed.





BETHLEHEM FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Bethlehem Fire Department responds to a wide variety of emergencies throughout the City of Bethlehem. Ensuring the safety of our residents and visitors is our top priority.



NEW FIREFIGHTERS

On Friday, June 7, 2024, seven new City of Bethlehem firefighters graduated from the Allentown Fire Academy. During the academy, the firefighters received a wide array of training in firefighting, emergency medical training, hazardous materials, vehicle rescue and rope rescue just to name a few. They earned 28 certifications in total during the 20-week academy. We welcome these new firefighters into our Fire Department.

BETHLEHEM POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Police Department's goal is simple: to make Bethlehem a safe place for citizens to raise and nurture a family and for our business community to prosper.



The City of Bethlehem Police Department's School Resource Officers (SROs) held their annual Junior Police Academy (JPA) at Northeast Middle School from June 10 – June 21, 2024. Students from all four of the city's middle schools were eligible to apply.

During the two-week program, the cadets engaged in classroom activities, having the opportunity to meet and talk to law enforcement. They also engaged in team-building and physical agility activities. Courtesy of Lehigh University, the cadets participated in their low-ropes course, where the cadets focused on decision making, effective communication and team-building skills.

A number of officers from within our police department's various units presented to the cadets. This provided the opportunity for the cadets to learn about several law enforcement career opportunities and the entry requirements for each chosen path. Visiting units included Patrol, Mounted Unit, Special Operations, Traffic, Community Services, Investigations, Forensic Services, K-9 and the Bethlehem Service Center, among others.

Additionally, the cadets were introduced to a variety of criminal justice professionals from outside agencies, such as the FBI, Lehigh County Sheriff's Office, Lehigh County Judges, Northampton County Juvenile Probation, City of Bethlehem Fire Department, City of Bethlehem Paramedics, Pennsylvania State Police, Local Magistrates, Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement, Lehigh County Auto Theft Task Force and many more.

Each day, the cadets were provided breakfast and lunch. A special thanks to Aramark Food Services as well as several local businesses: Goosey Gander, Martellucci's, Borderline Restaurant, Lehigh Pizza, Casa Del Mofongo, Williams Spanish Restaurant, NYC Village Pizza and 8th Ave. Wawa.

The SROs would not be able to continue to host their annual JPA if not for the support of the Bethlehem Police Department, the Bethlehem Area School District, Lehigh and Northampton County Law Enforcement Agency presenters, the Bethlehem city businesses, the students who aspire to enter a career in law enforcement and for their parents who support their dreams and allow us the time to show them a window to their future.

In an effort to have the most up-to-date and accurate information on file, the Water and Sewer Department kindly asks that customers provide updated mailing addresses, phone numbers and e-mail contact info. This personal information is kept confidential and is only used for emergency notifications, such as water main breaks, boil water advisories, hydrant flushing activity and to address meter alarms that may be indicative of high water usage.

Customers can update their information in one of three ways:

- Complete the "Update Contact Information" section on the back of your water/sewer bill when remitting payment.

- 3 Send an email to custserv@bethlehem-pa.gov.

2024 City of Bethlehem **Real Estate Tax Bills**

Property tax bills were mailed out in early January. Please note as per Pennsylvania tax collection law Section 7. Effect of Failure to Receive a Tax Notice (Purdon's Statute 72, Section 5511.7), "Failure to receive notice shall not relieve any taxpayer from the payment of any taxes imposed by any taxing district, and such taxpayer shall be charged with (their) taxes as though (they) had received notice."

Therefore, if you did not receive your real estate tax bill, please contact the City of Bethlehem Tax Bureau at 610-865-7022, Option 5 to request a duplicate copy.

ESCROW ACCOUNTS

If your mortgage company or bank pays your taxes through an escrow account, it is your responsibility to make sure that your mortgage company receives the bill. You are ultimately responsible for any late payment penalties added to your bill, even if your account is paid through an escrow account. Make sure your lender has the correct information to avoid unwanted penalties! All 2024 property taxes unpaid as of December 31, 2024, will be turned over to a collection agency.



Occasionally, customers are approached by imposters posing as water utility employees asking to read their water meter, offer a rebate or claim they need to check on something in the house. These are potential scam artists or burglars attempting to gain access to your home under false pretenses. Know that all City of Bethlehem Water Department employees and contractors carry an identification card with photo at all times. You may see a meter reader in your neighborhood every month or quarter to read your water meter, but this person does not need to enter your home. Also, any service calls to repair or replace a water meter are arranged and scheduled in advance. Always ask a City employee or contractor to present their identification before allowing them access to your home or business.

- Do not open your door to someone you do not recognize. Do not allow anyone to enter your home if you are not sure of the person's identity.
- · Ask to see photo identification. Legitimate employees and contractors will be happy to show their ID; or call the utility to verify identification.
- Call the Bethlehem Service Center, 610-865-7000, if you are unsure about a person's identification or to verify work to be done at your home.
- Do not allow anyone to enter your home claiming to collect a past-due bill; make an inspection; or to sell utility products, such as a meter or other equipment. City employees do not engage in door-to-door sales calls, do not collect past-due bills in person and do not deliver rebates or refunds.

Call the police or dial 911 if you believe the person or caller is an imposter.



FRIENDLY REMINDER TO OUR COMMUNITY

In accordance with Article 721 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Bethlehem, this is to remind all our residents to refrain from placing tree branches and other storm debris onto the streets following severe wind/storm events. This creates hazards, makes it harder for emergency and cleaning services to respond and hampers our crews' efforts to restore the public right of ways to normal condition in a reasonable timeframe. Our teams work hard to keep our streets safe and clean, and your cooperation is greatly and sincerely appreciated.

Please make sure to arrange for debris removal per our local waste management guidelines. The Citizens' Christmas City Committee is seeking donations of tall trees for the Christmas holiday season. The trees need to be nicely shaped, 40-50 feet in height, a single trunk all the way to the top and must be accessible to the roadway with no power lines between the tree and the road. The tree must be within five miles of Center City. City Electrician Greg Cryder will come out to the location and inspect the tree for acceptability.

We are also seeking the donation of a nicely shaped 15 - 20 foot tree. The deadline for donation is October 15. The trees will be cut and collected on November 6.

Donation of these trees will be recognized at the annual Christmas City Tree Lighting Ceremony, which will take place on Friday, November 29, 2024, at 5 pm on Payrow Plaza.

STORM-DAMAGED TREE; WHAT TO DO?

With all the intense and ever-changing weather, what does one do after a large storm goes through the City of Bethlehem?

Storm-damaged trees can be worrisome and for the right reasons. When a tree becomes damaged with the storm, there are a few steps you can take. The first step is to look for any potential hazards or safety concerns before clean up can begin. Look for any downed wires or hanging or broken tree branches. Stay away from these areas and contact the correct department or company that can assist you. When hanging branches or broken branches are an issue, call for the assistance of an arborist who has the correct tools and safety training in scenarios like these.

In the City of Bethlehem, any work completed on a street tree or any tree within the public right of way must be completed by a licensed arborist. An updated licensed arborist list can be found at bethlehem-pa.gov/Public-Works/Bureaus/Urban-Forestry. Once an arborist is on site, they can mitigate the hazard and help remove any wounded tree limbs, repair torn bark and make clean cuts to broken branches. All of these steps taken by a professional will help your tree survive and heal properly. With that being said, sometimes storm damage can be severe. If a large part of the trunk or canopy has been removed, total tree removal may be required. Discuss this with an arborist to determine the best plan of action and options for your tree. Storm damage takes a community effort to help with clean up, damages and other potential risks. Each scenario and tree evaluation can be different depending on the condition of the tree, so it is best to let a professional arborist assess the issue. Safety is of the utmost importance, so if you do not know what to do, it is best to stay safe and ask for help!


SPECIAL EVENTS ONLINE APPLICATION PROCESS

Estimates with postevent fees will also be uploaded by each individual department as your event is reviewed and transitions through the approval process. You can check the status of your application at any time during the **PERMITS** review to obtain updates.


Get Loud at the Library with Studio 11 and Open Mic!



No dumping: Dumping is illegal, and violators will be fined according to City Ordinances and PA DEP Guidelines.

Please note: All loads must be tarped when entering or exiting the facility.

Loading service: \$10 per cubic yard. Loading services end daily at 2:45 pm. Pickup trucks can no longer be self-loaded. There is a limit of three 30-gallon containers that may be self-loaded.

Please note: Materials may only be dropped off when the Center is open and operating. Only **QUALIFIED RESIDENTS** and property owners within the City of Bethlehem may drop off materials at the Yard Waste Facility. You must show a valid driver's license and compost card on every drop-off trip.

Located at 250 E. Broad St., the small but focused store isn't just


