

Mayor's Address to the City of Bethlehem



Some days, it can appear as if our culture has some difficulty celebrating positive outcomes. Positive accomplishments are breezed by or forgotten quickly as we move on to complain about the next thunderstorm, Phillies playoff disappointment or a chaotic event in Washington. I am fortunate to work

in an environment, Bethlehem City Hall, where amazing things are accomplished every day by our dedicated public servants. Those accomplishments aren't always celebrated at press conferences, in social media posts or at public meetings. Tasks are accomplished that make our city just a bit better, and the professionals who did the work move on to the next task at hand.

It is important, however, that we stop and review those accomplishments, small and large, that are helping our city to continue to grow and become an even stronger community. I decided to spend our 2024 year in review by sitting down with a notepad and writing 10 of the wonderful successes that are reasons for Bethlehem to celebrate:

- February 1, 2024 The City made its first annual debt payment as we continue to rapidly pay off our debt. The City has worked hard to reduce our debt from \$170 million to \$88 million in a span of nine years (48% percent reduction). Our current debt payment schedule will see a further decrease to \$55 million by January 1, 2028. By 2028, we will have reduced our debt load by almost 70 percent. Our reduced long-term debt is a major reason why Bethlehem's Standard & Poor's bond rating has improved seven times in the past 10 years and sits at AA- with a Stable outlook, the best bond rating among the top 10 cities in population in Pennsylvania.
- February 26, 2024 The first of our four new paramedics was hired as we increased our paramedic staff for the first time since 2007.
- April 10, 2024 In a partnership with Lehigh Valley Industrial Park, the City announced Gateway on 4, a 110-unit, mixedincome housing development in South Bethlehem.
- April 15, 2024 The City started our 2024-2025 paving season with a two-year plan to spend \$7.9 million on new street overlays. This is a 61% increase in paving spending from the \$4.8 spent by the City in 2022 and 2023.
- July 26, 2024 Bethlehem became the United States' 26th World Heritage Site during the World Heritage Conference in Delhi, India. Our inscription became the first transnational site in the United States.
- August 14, 2024 The City hired eight new firefighters to help replace several retirements in 2024. Working with our International Association of Fire Fighters union, the City found budgetary savings to send a second class of recruits in 2024, enabling the new firefighters to start work in January of 2025. Alternatively, waiting until January 2025 to hire these recruits would have meant they couldn't start until July 2025, thereby increasing our overtime costs and stress on current personnel.
- September 20, 2024 Patillas, Puerto Rico became our sixth sister city in a celebration in Bethlehem that saw us welcome a group of community and business leaders from Patillas.

- October 24, 2024 The City, in conjunction with the Bethlehem Parking Authority, and the Coalition for Appropriate Transportation (CAT) announced a lease for one of the two new retail spaces in the new Walnut Street Garage, which is set to open in November of 2025. CAT is a non-profit dedicated to supporting bicycling, pedestrians and public transportation in the Lehigh Valley. The City also launched our related Complete Streets plan that will design future streets to maximize safety for pedestrians and bikers.
- November 22, 2024 City Hall completed the purchase of the last 1.2 miles of the South Bethlehem Greenway. Months of negotiations, surveys, easements, appraisals, grant agreements and hard work were needed for the completion. Construction of this last phase of the Greenway should be completed by the spring of 2026. When completed, the trail will connect to the Saucon Rail Trail and create a continuous trail into Bucks County for travelers.
- December 9, 2024 The City hired its first Sustainability Manager as a key implementation piece of our Climate Action Plan. The position will coordinate our nine implementation groups as well as work with our private and public sector partners to create an even more sustainable and healthy community.

There is a common thread throughout these events. Each one of these accomplishments required numerous City Hall employees in multiple departments. For that, I and all of us in Bethlehem need to say "thank you." It would have taken a much longer space to include all of the wonderful things going on externally from City Hall throughout the Bethlehem Area School District, our private sector, our non-profit world, our arts world and in every section of our community. Positive things are happening quicker than we can talk about them. While the new year has brought forth new challenges, we remain committed to keeping Bethlehem a vibrant, safe and inclusive city. In 2025, our list of successes will be even longer – and we thank you for being a part of it!

A NOTE FROM CITY COUNCIL

Council President's Report

In the blink of an eye, we are approaching the summer of 2025. Reflecting back on 2024, what an exciting year we had. It was a year that saw Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, join the likes of Athens, Venice, London and Rome as cities on the world stage of UNESCO



World Heritage Sites. In 2024, the Historic Moravian Bethlehem District, as part of the transnational site of Moravian Church Settlements, was named a historic destination, joining world-renowned landmarks such as the Acropolis, the Roman Forum, Vatican City and the Great Wall of China.

Much credit belongs to the Bethlehem World Heritage Council and Commission along with the Bethlehem Area Moravians, Central Moravian Church, Historic Bethlehem Museums & Sites and Moravian University. For its part, City Council was pleased to support the efforts in any way possible that led to Inscription last summer. We are proud to help our City celebrate this momentous achievement.

In addition to brimming with pride over our City's history, in 2024, Council also supported actions toward ensuring Bethlehem's future. Council's Committee of the Whole met to review plans to demolish and reconstruct the Walnut Street Garage. Council also held public hearings to approve a zoning map change and street vacation to make way for the garage. Demolition has taken place, and the garage's replacement is anticipated in time for the 2025 Christmas season with additional adjacent development being planned.

Council also continues to support efforts to reduce homelessness and create affordable housing. Council endorsed efforts to apply for grant money toward the Gateway on 4th and authorized two contracts to enhance the Pembroke Choice Neighborhood Project. The first was for a traffic study to review the Pembroke Road and Stefko Boulevard corridor. The second was to conduct a market study to evaluate the demand for affordable market-rate rental and for-sale housing.

Additionally, Council has approved moving forward with the work necessary for making significant street changes, including restoring two-way traffic to Center and Linden streets. Major renovations also are planned to make much of East and West Broad streets pedestrian and bicycle friendly and generally more appealing. Council also has authorized refurbishment at the Waste Water Treatment Plant and replacement of a 2-million-gallon reservoir drinking tank.

Meanwhile, grants, contracts and other authorizations involving City parks and recreation have frequented Council agendas. Bethlehem reached a milestone late in 2024 with the final purchase of land that will close the Greenway Trail Gap, which completes a dream several years in the making. Council passed resolutions authorizing Phase II of improvements to the Monocacy Trail. And, it authorized work to be done to make significant improvements to Saucon Park, the Rose Garden and Fairview Park, as well as a complete makeover of Friendship Park. In addition, Council authorized a study of the City's entire parks system to provide a comprehensive prioritization of future needs.

In all during calendar year 2024, Council held 24 regular meetings. It conducted 13 committee meetings, three of which were Committee of the Whole meetings, including one on ethics training for Council and the Administration. Council also held a Curative Amendment hearing lasting 7½ hours over two nights to consider proposed changes to the Limited Commercial Zoning District. The year's body of work led to the passage of 61 ordinances and 280 resolutions. Key legislation passed included a new article to curtail the use of illegal dirt bikes and all-terrain vehicles on City streets with intentions of improving safety and reducing nuisances, and amending the Animal Ordinance to ban the sale of pets from puppy mills within the City.

Now, as we approach the official first days of summer, 2025 promises to be another busy year. Efforts will continue to help the homeless and promote affordable housing as well as work to complete initiatives that were started in 2024 and preceding years as well. And, as always, Council will continue to work with the Administration and all City departments to bring the residents and businesses of Bethlehem the services that they have come to expect.

The Bethlehem Fire Department responds to a wide variety of emergencies throughout the City of Bethlehem. Ensuring the safety of our residents and visitors is our top priority.

SUMMERTIME FIRE SAFETY

Simple Steps to Stay Summer-Safe

■ Fireworks

- Be safe. If you want to see fireworks, go to a public show.
- · Do not use consumer fireworks.
- Keep a close eye on children at events with fireworks.

■ Clean out dryer vents

- At the minimum, dryer vents need to be cleaned out at least once a year – and ideally every six months if you run a lot of laundry, such as families with small children.
- Make sure that the air exhaust vent pipe (outside your house) is not restricted and the flap opens when the dryer is running.
- Keep anything flammable, such as boxes or cleaning supplies, away from the dryer.
- Clean out the lint trap after every cycle.

■ Inspect your grill

Before you host your first springtime barbecue, give your grill a full inspection, checking for grease or fat buildup, spider webs and any other nests or debris. If you use a gas grill, ensure the propane tank hose has no leaks before you use it.

- Leaks or breaks were the factor in 11% of grill structure fires and 23% of outside and unclassified grill fires.
- Gas grills contribute to a higher number of home fires overall than their charcoal counterparts.
- A failure to clean the grill was the leading factor contributing to the fire in 19% of all grill-related structure fires.
- In 17% of the related fires, something that could catch fire
 was too close to the grill. Grills need to be at least 10 feet
 away from the house, decks and any other combustibles
 when in use.
- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should be used outdoors only.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

■ Properly dispose of yard waste

- Remove all dead plants and other combustible materials from around your house, especially within the first five feet of space around the home.
- Make sure the gutters are clean and that dead leaves and pine needles are removed from the roof as well.
- Wood piles and trash should all be kept at least 30 feet away from your house and any other buildings or sheds.

■ Properly store and dispose of painting materials

- The oils used in oil-based paints and stains actually release heat as they dry. If rags covered in these materials are left in a trapped space, a fire can break out. Don't leave cleaning rags or stain rags in a pile. Let them dry outside and keep them far away from your house. Ideally, hang rags outside or spread them out from one another, weighing them down so they don't blow away.
- Dried rags can be kept in a tightly covered metal container, which should be filled with a water and detergent mixture to break down the oils. Containers of oily rags should be kept in a cool place out of direct sunlight, away from any heat sources. Then, properly dispose of such materials.
- Paint should be stored in a dry place out of direct sunlight.

■ Replace smoke detector batteries

- Spring is a great time to replace the batteries in all of your smoke detectors. Make it a habit to do this at least once a year.
- When you do this, test out each detector to make sure they're all working.
- Take some time to chat with your family about your fire escape plan. Practice the plan to make sure everyone knows what to do if a fire emergency happens.

Keep these tips in mind as you and your family enjoy your summer!

- 1. Call 610-865-7000. This number can be reached by house phone line or by cell phone. This will dial directly into the BSC for non-emergency questions/city inquiries or city services.
- 2. Bethlehem Service Center App: The app is available to download for most cell phones and tablets on either the Play Store or the App Store on your device. Search for "Bethlehem Service Center" or "City of Bethlehem" under Apps, or scan the QR code to the left. Access key information at your fingertips with this easy-to-use mobile application. Receive emergency notifications, submit a service request, find out what to do in Bethlehem, find parking, view bus schedules, pay your bills and much more.
- 3. Email: The BSC can also be reached via email at: bethlehemservicecenter@bethlehem-pa.gov.
- 4. City of Bethlehem Web Page and Portal: Visit bethlehem-pa.gov, click "Online Services" in the main menu, then click "My Account." Here, you will be able to submit a service request.

Examples of "non-emergency" customer service: dirty water, pot holes that need to be repaired, debris in the street, recycling issues, etc. The BSC will also provide assistance to any City of Bethlehem residents who may have questions or concerns that need to be addressed.





LEAD AND HEALTHY HOMES PROGRAM

The City of Bethlehem is offering a great chance to make your home safer and healthier through its Lead and Healthy Homes program. This program is available for renters and homeowners in the Bethlehem Area School District.

Here are some of the problems the program can help fix:

- · Lead-based paint
- Radon
- Home hazards like electrical issues, moisture, tripping risks and more!

You can get a free home inspection during which trained experts will check for these problems and help you make your home safer. The program also provides helpful tips on keeping your home healthy and free from other health risks.

How to qualify:

- You must live in the Bethlehem Area School District (whether you rent or own your home).
- Your household income must be at or below certain limits based on how many people live in your home (check the chart to see if you qualify).

Northside Alive is a community-driven neighborhood revitalization process launched in 2018 by the City of Bethlehem and Community Action Development Bethlehem.

In 2024, Northside Alive focused on the people and places that strengthen our community. We dedicated resources to improving our public spaces; upheld successful initiatives such as community yoga, yard sales and block parties; and launched new programs driven by community input, including Restaurant Week and Music in the Park. Throughout the year, Northside Alive organized over 18 community events in partnership with neighborhood businesses and non-profit partners. These events strengthen our neighborhoods by providing residents and visitors with informal opportunities to connect.









We continue to make lasting neighborhood investments that support the goals of Northside Alive and beautify our streetscapes. If you shopped local this holiday season, you may have noticed new holiday pole wraps continuing down East Broad Street and a new mural designed by Artist Matt Halm at the intersection of Linden and E. North.

We continue to invest in resident-driven projects and look forward to the Bethlehem Co-Op Market, several pedestrian-friendly improvements and the redevelopment of Friendship Park. The Friendship Park Project officially went out to bid in February!





Water Meter Replacement Project

The City of Bethlehem Water Department maintains approximately 37,000 metered accounts in the City and surrounding communities. With our older water meters, meter readers take readings using a hand-held recorder placed on the black "touch-pad" device located on the outside of your home or business. This action requires the reader to walk up to every home and business to take the reading. Meter readers carry identification so that you know the person is a City employee. You may ask to see their credentials for safety and security reasons.

The City began a transition to an automatic meter reading system several years ago. This system requires replacement of your water meter and installation of a transmitter/receiver device over the touch-pad on the outside of your home. This allows the City to record meter readings and track usage remotely through radio towers. This will save the City valuable time and money, improve reading accuracy and will cut down on the number of estimated bills. The new system also alerts City staff if your usage exceeds your normal rate so that we can contact you promptly to address any potential

problems. You will see no change in your billing statement under the new system.



The City is sub-contracting some of this work to VEPO Metering. If you receive a letter or phone call from VEPO requesting to set up an appointment to replace your meter, simply follow the instructions to schedule an appointment. VEPO personnel also carry appropriate credentials for safety and security purposes.

The City's goal is to replace 25,000 meters over a six-year time frame. The total cost of this project is approximately \$10 million.

Identifying Service Line Material

The City of Bethlehem Water Department is required by federal regulation to identify service pipe material to all properties with the goal to replace all lead and galvanized steel pipes by 2037.. To this end, the City needs your help in identifying the pipe material of your home's water service line by following instructions on the City website: www.bethlehem-pa. gov/Water-Sewer-Resources/Public-Information/Lead-Service-Lines. Having a lead service line does not mean your drinking water contains high lead levels. The City employs corrosion control treatment that greatly reduces the chance of lead leaching into the water and is effective at keeping lead levels below the EPA maximum action level of 0.010 mg/L.

To determine the service line material entering your home, locate the water meter in your basement or lowest level. Look at the pipe that comes through the outside wall and connects to the water meter. Note the color of the pipe and compare against the examples in the picture to determine your service line material. If your service line is silver-gray, use a small magnet to differentiate between lead and galvanized steel pipe. The magnet will stick to galvanized steel but not to lead.



Lead: Non-magnetic, silver-gray color that easily scratches with a coin.



Copper: Non-magnetic, color of a copper penny.



Galvanized Steel: Magnetic, dull gray color.



Plastic: Non-magnetic, white or black rigid pipe.

Brass: Non-ma

Brass: Non-magnetic, color varies from silvery yellow to reddish brown.

Report your findings to the City using the form at the above referenced website or by email to LeadServiceLine@bethlehem-pa.gov.

There are other ways to check for lead piping. Look for an EPA-recognized lead test kit at your local hardware or home improvement store or hire a licensed plumber to perform a pipe survey of your home.

Installment Plan: Installment payments may not commence after the first installment due date. A grace period of five (5) days beginning with the due date is allowed for each installment. If not paid within five days beginning with the due date, a penalty of 10% will be added to each delinquent installment. No discounts are allowed on installment payments unless the full tax is paid during the discount period. **Note:** If you are paying by installments, you will be billed for subsequent payments.

All property taxes unpaid as of **December 31, 2025**, will be turned over to a collection agency.

EARNED INCOME TAX & LOCAL SERVICES TAX

Earned Income Tax (EIT) Filing

The Earned Income Tax (EIT) rate for the City of Bethlehem is a 1% income tax that is assessed on the gross earnings of residents and non-residents and net profits of residents. Just like federal and state income taxes, EIT tax returns must be filed online: https://efile. keystonecollects.com/#/login or by mail on or before April 15, 2025.

Local Services Tax (LST) Filing

The Local Services Tax (LST) rate for the City of Bethlehem is \$52 per person who is employed or self-employed within the City of Bethlehem. Most employers withhold this tax and list it as the "LST TAX" on an employee's pay stub or W-2 form. Self-employed persons are responsible to file/pay the tax themselves quarterly.

The City of Bethlehem uses a third-party servicer for collection of Earned Income Taxes and LST Filing. Earned Income Tax filing and LST filings are collected and processed by:

BUSINESS PRIVILEGE & MERCANTILE TAX/LICENSING

Business Privilege and Mercantile Tax/License Filing A Business Privilege License (BPL) is required by all persons and/ or businesses that engage in a business, profession or other commercial activity within the City of Bethlehem. The BPL annual license fee is \$25. The license period runs from May 1 through April 30 of the following year.

The 2024 Business Privilege & Mercantile Tax Return is due on or before May 05, 2025.

The City of Bethlehem uses a third-party servicer for collection of the BPL Licensing and collection of Business Privilege and Mercantile Tax. All BPL registrations, Business Privilege and Mercantile tax payments and returns for the City of Bethlehem are processed by:

SEDIMENT, STREAMS AND SILT SOCKS

Silt is a sediment that's a grain size between a sand grain and a clay particle. Silt can naturally enter and build up in waterways after tens and hundreds of years of erosion. However, modern day urbanization, construction and deforestation has caused an influx of silt to enter our streams in a much shorter time span. This increase in silt shocks aquatic ecosystems, leading to adverse effects on the entire food chain:

- Silt is small enough to enter the gills of fish and aquatic invertebrates (shrimp, crayfish, snails, etc.). Taking up too much silt leads to suffocation and eventual death of the organism.
- · Silt can fill in burrows or other holes, destroying habitats and disrupting breeding patterns.
- Silt can decrease water clarity, in turn making it harder for plant life to grow. Decreased clarity also makes it difficult for predators to find food.

These effects have not gone unnoticed. States and local municipalities have put ordinances and other measures in place to help protect our streams from unnecessary influxes of silt. The most prominent of these has been implementing Erosion and Sedimentation (E&S) plans to any large earth disturbance and/or construction projects. Here in the City of Bethlehem, we conduct extensive reviews of E&S plans brought forth by new construction and make sure that they are at/or above standards before issuing approvals and permits. Some erosion control methods are silt socks, silt fences and vegetation covers. If you have any questions about how to properly prepare your area/site (big or small) for earthwork, please don't hesitate to contact our Stormwater Department at 610-849-2787.



URBAN FORESTRY

Do you have a tree you have been looking to have removed for some time but are unsure what your first step is in getting the work done? When it comes to the City of Bethlehem, any tree that is located within the public right of way or considered a street tree will require a permit and licensed arborist. These are both required for any type of tree work completed in the public right of way, such as pruning, removing or planting a tree. If you are unsure whether or not your tree falls within the public right of way, a quick rule of thumb can be that a tree is in the public right of way if it is located between the curb and the sidewalk, also called a tree lawn or tree well. If there is no sidewalk in your area, you can contact the Forestry Department to confirm. It is always better to ask before taking action!

If the tree is on private property, the property owner does not need permission for arranging for further pruning, removal or planting. If you do have a street tree, download the street tree permit and licensed arborist list from the City of Bethlehem Urban Forestry page. From that list, you contact the professional(s) listed and acquire quotes from the arborist(s) of your choosing. Once you have the licensed arborist squared away, you or the arborist will submit the street tree permit application for approval. The permit can be mailed into or dropped off in person at Bethlehem City Hall. Please make sure all sections of the permit application are filled out completely for processing. If the permit is approved, you will be contacted to make arrangements for pick up and you may schedule the work with your licensed arborist. Your permit will state the requirements for a replacement tree, the scope of work and any notes that need to be included.

BE AWARE OF DIRTY DIRT!

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) wants to help residents and contractors in Pennsylvania ensure they do not accept or use fill materials that may cause contamination. Fill materials are used to bring sites to desirable grades to enhance the usefulness of the properties.

Homeowners and contractors need to be aware that there are some "fill" materials out there that can cause potential environmental and/or health concerns, as well as open up property owners to potential liabilities. Here are a few tips to ensure you are using acceptable fill materials on your property.

Do your homework...

- Before you buy or accept "FREE" dirt, make sure it is clean.
- Know the source of the fill, especially if it is offered to you for FREE.
- · Know the supplier and hauler. Check for references.
- Ask for documentation from the provider regarding the source:
 - A bill of lading if you purchased it.
 - An official **DEP FP-001** form that identifies where the fill came from and any testing that was done.
- Do not accept any free material without documentation.

Take a look...or smell...

- If the fill has a petroleum/oil-like or garbage odor...BEWARE!
- If the fill has materials such as: plastic; ash; demolition debris such as wallboard, shingles, nails, wood or paint chips...BEWARE!
- If the fill appears to be "discolored" or stained...BEWARE!
- If you don't know the source of the fill...BEWARE!

Get some advice...

- The DEP wants residents and contractors in Pennsylvania to make sure they do not accept or use fill materials that may contain or cause contamination.
- Check with your regional office if you have questions, consult with your local Bureau of Waste Management or DEP office.
- If you don't know the source of the fill...BEWARE!

2025 STREET SWEEPING SCHEDULE

The Department of Public Works Bureau of Streets began its street sweeping program on April 1. During this time frame, street sweeping activities will occur every Tuesday through Friday between 7:30 am and 2 pm, on the posted roads throughout the city limits and street sweeping districts. The regularly scheduled street sweeping routes that are main thoroughfares in the city are posted with "No Parking" signs alerting motorists of parking restrictions for a given day and time. Vehicles must be kept off these posted streets to allow for effective street cleaning.

The city is divided into 88 sweeping districts that are not posted. The city normally deploys three sweepers each day to run through these districts pursuant to sweeping on posted roads. Roads that are less than 12 feet wide do not get swept. Noted dates indicate when the posted street will be swept. Dates are for information only and are subject to change. Please follow the signs that are posted on your side of the street. In order to properly clean your street, we need your cooperation. 





Materials accepted: Leaves; small brush; hedge and shrub trimmings; and Christmas trees free of tinsel, decorations and lights. Christmas trees must not be in plastic bags.

Materials NOT accepted: Grass; hay; straw; tree stumps; root balls; soil: dirt; sod; mulch; bamboo; ornamental grass; pumpkins; cornstalks; acceptable materials not bagged, bundled or containerized; or items exceeding length, width or weight requirements.



Materials NOT accepted: Sod, grass clippings, tree stumps, hay/ straw, plastic bags, soil/mulch, root balls, bamboo, ornamental grass. No dumping: Dumping is illegal, and violators will be fined according to City Ordinances and PA DEP Guidelines.

Please note: All loads must be tarped when entering or exiting

Loading service: \$10 per cubic yard. Loading services end daily at 2:45 pm. Pickup trucks can no longer be self-loaded. There is a limit of three 30-gallon containers that may be self-loaded.

Please note: Materials may only be dropped off when the Center is open and operating. Only **QUALIFIED RESIDENTS** and property owners within the City of Bethlehem may drop off materials at the Yard Waste Facility. You must show a valid driver's license and compost card on every drop-off trip.
