We are also making daily progress in creating a more sustainable city by investing in our neighborhoods and community. We are proud that our "Year One" goals and priorities are in the process of being implemented for each section of our comprehensive Climate Action Plan. Our NorthSide 2027 initiative continues to see park, recreation, and infrastructure investments come to life. In the spring, we also launched West Bethlehem investments that included Live in the Rose Garden summer concerts, park improvements, and a new vision for a more walkable and livable Broad Street. While substantial progress has been made on all of these initiatives, we couldn't be more excited for the next phases of our community and neighborhood revitalization plans which we well be announcing in the coming months and throughout 2023.

We hope you find this issue of our newsletter to be empowering and a communication of care from the Administration and all of our civic leaders. We thank you for your passionate commitment to our city and wish you and your loved ones a joyous holiday season!

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We Build Bethlehem

The secret is out nationwide: Bethlehem is an amazing place to live.

Those of us who live here experience it when we take our dogs for a walk on the towpath, catch a concert at the Levitt Pavilion on the SteelStacks campus or dine on Main Street.

As word spreads, it is reflected in our hot real estate market and the boom of new development.


It's made affordable housing a constant topic of conversation in Bethlehem City Hall.

We want our City to remain a community that embraces its longtime residents and welcomes newcomers. We know we cannot do that without a healthy housing market that offers entry points for folks across the income spectrum.

That's why the City has launched an affordable housing strategies study with the help of the Reinvestment Fund. The Philadelphia-based firm in 2017 developed Bethlehem's blight strategy, which resulted in overhauling the city's housing inspection program, the creation of a new rental registration program and a blighted property certification process.

Now the Reinvestment Fund will expand that work with a study that leaves the City with a road map to preserve and expand affordable housing in Bethlehem. This study builds upon Bethlehem's 2021 selection as one of five communities

participating in a virtual workshop led by New York University's Furman Center's Housing Solution Labs.




This work has great urgency. We know many Bethlehem residents are currently struggling with the rising cost of housing, gas and groceries. Those needs can't wait.


This is where the American Rescue Plan comes in. It has given Bethlehem a once-in-a-generation opportunity to rethink how we approach housing and tackle systemic inequities.

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




- -Take your vehicle's key; do not leave it in or on your vehicle.

Bethlehem EMS Celebrates 50 Years

The History of Bethlehem EMS

Bethlehem EMS began service as a provider of pre-hospital emergency care in June of 1972. They were part of the City of Bethlehem Fire Department and were stationed at the City's property at Rodgers Street near Easton Avenue & Clermont Streets. The service was staffed at its inception by nine full-time EMTs operating at a basic life support (BLS) level. One ambulance was on duty 24/7. The annual call volume was approximately 2,500.

In 1980, Bethlehem EMS became an advanced life support (ALS) service, and was staffed by more highly trained personnel: Paramedics and Pre-Hospital Registered Nurses/Health Professionals. These individuals perform the same functions of a basic EMT, but go beyond that, and provide pre-hospital advanced life support, which includes utilizing a heart monitor/pacemaker/defibrillator, providing medications, initiating intravenous fluids, 12 lead EKG's, administration of medications and other more advanced treatments. The staffing level was increased to 12 full-time providers, 8 Part-Time providers and an EMS Manager. The service was relocated to the City's new public works complex at Stefko Boulevard and East Broad Streets. The ambulance fleet was increased to 3 units, and at the end of the decade a second day shift ambulance crew was added from 7AM-3PM Monday – Friday. Call volume had increased to approximately 3,500.

In 1995 two EMS Supervisors and a 3:00 pm - 11:00 pm ambulance crew were added. The ambulance fleet increased to 5 vehicles, 2 of which had to be stored outside due to



space limitations. An Administrative Assistant position was added to handle EMS Billing. Call volume continued to rise to over 5,500 calls annually by the end of 1999.

2001 brought about a restructuring of EMS. The Manager was renamed EMS Director and an Assistant EMS Director position was created as well. A second ambulance was added to night shift. Annual call volume increased to over 6,100.

In 2003 the EMS Bureau was transferred to the Bethlehem Fire Department. Annual call volume continued to increase to 7,100.

In 2005 a third day shift ambulance crew was added and the ambulance fleet increased to 7 vehicles. 4 of the vehicles were housed outside due to continued space limitations. The full-time staff increased to 23 with 28 Part-Time providers, plus the

contracted full-time Administrative Assistant. Annual call volume

was nearing 8,000.

In May of 2012, the Dewberry EMS station was added at 201 Dewberry Ave. All vehicles, now 8 ambulances and 2 EMS Supervisor vehicles were able to be housed inside. Annual call volume was now over 11,000.

2015 saw the elimination of the Assistant EMS Director position with the restructuring of the administrative staff. The annual call volume was nearing 12,000.

Fifty years since its inception, the goal of the City of Bethlehem EMS remains to provide the best possible hospital care to sick and injured patients, and to ensure they receive prompt transport to the nearest appropriate hospital or other specialty care center (trauma or burn center). EMS continues to have a strong partnership with the Bethlehem Police and Fire Departments, who provide first responder services to EMS calls within the City of Bethlehem. Call volume is expected to exceed 12,000.

Project Lifesaver

Project Lifesaver is a search and rescue program operated internationally by public safety agencies, and is strategically designed for *atrisk* individuals who are prone to the life-threatening behavior of wandering. The primary mission of Project Lifesaver is to provide timely response to save lives and reduce potential injury for adults and children with the propensity to wander due to a cognitive condition, such as dementia and autism. The latest estimates for people living with autism in Northampton County is approximately 5,000. In the Lehigh Valley, approximately 25,000 people have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's and dementia.

Individuals enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small transmitter that emits a radio frequency. If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies the Project Lifesaver agency and a trained emergency team responds to the wanderer's area. Project Lifesaver is in a constant state of research and development to ensure the latest and most effective technologies are being utilized by the program both in the prevention of wandering and the recovery of a client in the event of elopement. Project Lifesaver has strategically designed methods and techniques for the

specific use of recovering individuals with a cognitive condition. When applied by first responders these innovative strategies enable the most efficient rescue of an eloped client. Project Lifesaver



provides first responders with a basic understanding of cognitive conditions, giving them the necessary tools needed to respond to an elopement, and to assess and effectively manage the safe and comfortable return of an eloped client.

The City of Bethlehem is proud to be a Project LifeSaver city. Public Works



City Street Trees

Please remember any work performed on a street tree requires a tree permit and all work must be performed by a City approved licensed arborist. Information and lists regarding trees, permits, and licensed arborists can be found

on the City of Bethlehem's website under Urban Forestry.

Permit and licensing requirements to perform work on trees within the right of way help monitor the status of the urban forest and regulate trees that have the potential to affect public property. The removal of dead or declining trees, use of proper pruning techniques, and specified clearances of vegetation from city infrastructure provide for the clear safe passage of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. These regulations concern the health, safety, and general welfare of the public while providing for the care and sustainability of our public trees. A well-maintained urban forest presents a neat, attractive image to residents and visitors while enhancing property values and contributing numerous environmental benefits.

Encouraging and engaging residents to take an active part in managing our City trees enables the community to project a sense of community pride and vitality. The careful and responsible management of our urban forest and compliance with the shade tree ordinance is essential if we are to ensure that future generations may experience the many benefits street trees offer the community. https://www.bethlehem-pa.gov/Public-Works/Urban-Forestry

Citizens' Christmas City Committee Seeking Donation of Large Christmas Trees

The Citizens' Christmas City Committee is seeking donations of tall trees for the Christmas holiday season. The trees need to be nicely shaped, 40-50 feet in height, a single trunk all the way to the top and must be accessible to the roadway with no power lines between the tree and the road. The tree must be within no more than 5 miles of center city. City Electrician Greg Cryder, will come out to the location and inspect the tree for acceptability.



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Stormwater

The City is subject to a permit under the Pennsylvania Clean Streams Law and the federal Clean Water Act that regulates Bethlehem's storm drainage system. This permit, known as a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) permit, imposes specific mandates on the City for preventing new pollution and reducing pollution from existing sources.

Stormwater is rain and melted snow that "runs off" the land. In natural, undeveloped areas, soil absorbs and filters most of the stormwater in a process called infiltration. The water that runs off the land in Bethlehem flows to Monocacy Creek, Nancy Run, Saucon Creek, and the Lehigh River.

During development, natural areas are replaced with roofs, driveways, sidewalks, and streets. These hard surfaces, called impervious surfaces, do not allow water to penetrate them and increase the volume and velocity of stormwater runoff. Stormwater runoff carries fertilizers, sediment, oil, grease, heavy metals, trash, and anything else deposited on impervious surfaces directly into the City's storm drain system and natural

stream systems. This can cause:

- Erosion of streams and decreased water quality;
- Contamination of downstream water quality and drinking water supplies; and,



Flooding, property damage, and damage to public storm drains.

This is a reminder to all home and property owners to not dispose any yard debris on to the street. The City of Bethlehem is taking action to clean up our community's stormwater runoff and to make necessary improvements. This will not only help to improve water quality and our environment for future generations, but also help protect residents and private property from damage due to flooding.

The Bethlehem Service Center is available for residents to contact for non-emergencies 24-hours a day, 7-days a week, and 365-days a year.





2022 CITY OF BETHLEHEM REAL ESTATE TAX BILLS

Property tax bills were mailed out in early January. Please note as per Pennsylvania tax collection law Section 7. Effect of Failure to Receive a Tax Notice (Purdon's Statute 72, Section 5511.7) Failure to receive notice shall not relieve any taxpayer from the payment of any taxes imposed by any taxing district, and such taxpayer shall be charged with his taxes as though he had received notice.

Therefore, if you did not receive your real estate tax bill, please contact the City of Bethlehem Tax Bureau at (610) 865-7022 to request a duplicate copy.

ESCROW ACCOUNTS

If your mortgage company or bank pays your taxes through an escrow account, it is your responsibility to make sure that your mortgage company receives the bill. You are ultimately responsible for any late payment penalties added to your bill, even if your account is paid through an escrow account. Make sure your lender has the correct information to avoid unwanted penalties!

All 2022 property taxes unpaid as of **December 31, 2022** will be turned over to a collection agency.

Bethlehem Food Co-Op

If you've passed by 250 E. Broad St. lately, you will hopefully have noticed a bevy of construction activity that in a year will bring a new community-owned, 'everyone welcome' grocery store to our community.

In addition to the opportunity to shop for fresh, locally-produced food, this full-service grocery store will provide good-paying jobs and a year-round sales outlet for local growers and producers.

The new store will be a 'hub' in the community. "We're looking to bring a place to Bethlehem where everyone feels welcome to not only shop, but to eat, participate in educational programs, and connect with their neighbors," said Carol Ritter, chair of the co-op's Board. A meeting space is on the list of features, including typical grocery store departments like produce, meat, dairy, bakery, deli, prepared foods, and health and household items.

The co-op's roots go back almost 11 years, when a group of friends recognized the need for better shopping options in Bethlehem's downtown area - the idea of a food co-op was launched, and it formally organized two years later.

Since then the group has grown to almost 1200 member households and organizations/businesses that have purchased an equity share in the co-op. "When we say the co-op is communityowned, we really do mean that we, the owners, make the decisions and own the store," continued Ritter. "But everyone will be welcome to shop at the food co-op."

The nine-member Board leads an extensive team of volunteers but has also assembled a team of professionals with expertise in food co-op project management, store design, and store décor. They are working on creating a space for the co-op's store on the ground floor of a four-story, mixed-use building planned for the site. Peron Development and Boyle Construction are driving the project.

In addition to the revenue generated by members' one-time payments, the co-op works to secure grants, including a number of funding opportunities through the City of Bethlehem. In July 2021,

U.S. Rep. Susan Wild announced a \$2.9 million grant to the City on behalf of the co-op's construction and start-up costs.

Other costs – such as supporting the co-op's "Membership for All" scholarship program for new members, educational programs, and the initial purchase of the store inventory – will be covered by the group's Community Investment Fund initiative to raise dollars for the co-op.

A key feature of that initiative is a "Naming Opportunities" project that allows an individual or business name to be displayed on part of the physical store, such as the produce department, kitchen space, or a bulk bin.

"Our food co-op is really by the community, for our community - we can't wait to get our doors open and shop alongside our neighbors for fresh, healthy, reasonably-priced locally-produced food," Ritter concluded.
