### 00\_1304 SPRING STREET DEMOLITION

The existing 2-1/2 story wood frame house is proposed to be demolished. The house is a Queen Anne Style house and was built in the late nineteenth century ( $\sim 1880$ ).

Though the house is a structure that belongs to an historically significant style in the United States, the house itself is non-significant, not only to the Queen Anne style, but also to the surrounding Mt. Airy Historic District. This is for two reasons. One, 1304 Spring Street has few of the key attributes that define a Queen Anne style house. And two, 1304 Spring Street lacks many of the design strategies employed in the surrounding houses of the district. Put simply, 1304 Spring Street is neither an exemplary structure of the Queen Anne style nor is it a structure that is entirely contextual.

The following documents seek to show 1304 Spring Street is not a significant structure, both within the Queen Anne style itself and within the Mt. Airy Historic District. Chart 1 compares the main features of an exemplary Queen Anne structure with the current features of 1304 Spring Street. Images follow this chart, showing what are considered by scholars' exemplary features of a Queen Anne style house, many of which 1304 Spring Street lacks. Following this chart is a comparison of idealized Queen Anne style house plans with the existing plan of 1304 Spring Street. These diagrams show Queen Anne style house plans typically\* 'break the box.' In other words, the layout of a typical Queen Anne style house is not a singular geometric shape (i.e. a single square or a single rectangle); but rather, the typical Queen Anne style house layout consists of multiple Euclidean shapes (typically square or rectangle shapes, but sometimes round or polygonal shapes) that pull apart from one another. 1304 Spring Street, on the other hand, is primarily a rectangle and does not 'break the box.' This diagrammatic comparison is important as it shows, in many ways, 1304 Spring Street has the 'skin' of a Queen Anne style house, but not the 'skeleton' of a Queen Anne style house.

The remaining documents seek to show the proposed new building at 1304 Spring Street aligns more with both the Queen Anne style and the Mt. Airy Historic District simultaneously. Chart 2 compares the main features of an exemplary Queen Anne style with the proposed features of the new building at 1304 Spring Street. Though not striving to be a direct Queen Anne style house (as this would be, in some ways, anachronistic), it does strive to employ many design strategies seen in an exemplary Queen Anne style house. Images follow this chart emphasizing this. Following the chart and images is a plan comparison of the proposed new building with typical Queen Anne style house layouts. Lastly, images of houses within the Mt. Airy Historic District are provided. These are added to emphasize many proposed strategies for the new building at 1304 Spring Street allow it to closely align with the surrounding context.


















