2021 Bethlehem City Council President's Report

During 2021, Bethlehem City Council held 24 regular meetings and 16 Committee and budget meetings, adopted 231 Resolutions, and passed 41 Ordinances. Below are some highlights from Council's 2021 legislative year.

In 2021, our City government continued adapting to the Covid-19 pandemic in order to protect public health while continuing to provide the highest quality services to our residents and surrounding municipalities. City Council commends former Mayor Robert Donchez and the Health Bureau for their exemplary leadership and hard work during this pandemic, which is now entering the third year.




In order to increase transparency, City Council started live streaming Council meetings in 2019 and that has been made permanent as Town Hall is now wired with the necessary audio visual equipment to allow for future streaming of council and other government meetings from Town Hall.

City Council reviewed and took action on several financial matters during 2021.

Council approved the Mayor's proposed 2022 budget after amending it to add an additional \$1.5 million dollars into the City's American Rescue Plan Community Reinvestment Allocation. Council also conducted an oversight hearing on funding related to the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act, also known as the CARES Act, and reviewed and approved related budget adjustments and funding allocations.

Moreover, Council authorized a grant to fund renovations at the Bethlehem Public Library and a PA Infrastructure

Investment Authority grant to fund work on the City water system. Additionally, Council passed Administration-initiated bills modifying water rates and charges along with certain EMS fees.

This year, Council conducted its fourth annual Financial Accountability Incentive Reporting hearing to evaluate the effectiveness of economic development incentives and increase transparency. These annual hearings are conducted in the Community Development Committee to review administration reports submitted to Council pursuant to Article 349 Economic Development Incentive Reporting and Evaluation, established in 2018.

After review in the Community Development Committee, Council passed an ordinance establishing an affordable housing Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance program in the City of Bethlehem. The program is designed to incentivize private development of affordable housing units in the city and to fund housing and rental assistancerelated programs. Council also adopted a resolution approving the City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice and passed an Administration-initiated bill amending Article 1739 related to inspections of regulated rental units.

Moreover, in 2021, Council adopted a resolution urging the City to incentivize operation of a grocery store at the Ahart's Market site in order to promote equity and protect the health and well-being of individuals and families in South Bethlehem and also adopted a resolution urging passage of legislation in the PA House to address the widespread nuisance of fireworks in the city.

Finally, after a groundswell of community attention, City Council adopted a resolution designating the Chimney Swift as the official Bird of the City of Bethlehem.

Or scan the QR code provided. Access key information at your fingertips with this easy to use mobile application. Receive emergency notifications, submit a service request, find out what to do in Bethlehem, parking, bus schedules, pay your bills and much more.



Bethlehem Climate Action Plan Wins Statewide Award

When Bethlehem adopted its Climate Action Plan (CAP) in April of 2021, the City was one of the first communities in the State to do so. The adoption of the CAP emphasizes Bethlehem's commitment to fighting global climate change. The CAP sets out targeted policies, programs, and projects that will mitigate Bethlehem's contribution to climate change and will also help the city build resilience and adapt to the effects of a changing climate. The plan includes actions and goals for both municipal operations and the community as a whole. Bethlehem will continue to lead by example, but the CAP includes recommendations that allow all of our residents and partners to participate in the implementation of the Plan.



In 2021 the CAP won an award from the Pennsylvania Planning Association (PPA) for its vision and inclusiveness. PPA notes that the CAP is a progressive, serious, and implementable plan that tackles one of the most complex planning issues communities face today and that the Plan embraces the principles of equitability, prosperity, resiliency, healthfulness, inclusivity, and science. It puts environmental justice and equity front and center while providing specific goals and strategies to reduce Bethlehem's greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to the changing climate. To make the Plan as inclusive and usable as possible, Bethlehem conducted an extensive and innovative outreach process, which led to a plan that is graphically compelling, easy to use, and applicable to a wide range of groups and individuals.

The development of the CAP would not have been possible without the input and support of all of the residents and partners that contributed throughout the public input process. The plan development was led by the expert consulting team at WSP along with the leadership of then Councilman William Reynolds.

In the near future more information will be distributed to show how each resident can be an important part in implementing this Plan and how the City will be incorporating the CAP recommendations into all of its policies and operations.

Keep Calm and Swim On

Having a backyard pool can be a fun way for you and your family to be active at home or just relax. However, it is important that you keep you and your family safe by making sure the pool you are enjoying is properly installed and safe for operation. To ensure your backyard pool is safe and installed properly, the City has prepared some swimming pool requirements that must be submitted and completed for a new pool installation.

Above-ground Swimming Pools

- 1. Submit a site plan, drawn to scale, showing the following: a Property lines
 - b Location of all improvements (home, outbuildings and new pool, etc.)
 - c Distance of new pool from property lines (must be a minimum 6')
- 2. Indicate location of power lines and distance to proposed pool (must be a minimum 10')
- 3. Pools shall have an alarmed door or self-locking gate
- 4. If the finished grade of the swimming pool is less than 48" high, a fence must be installed around the pool.
- 5. Submit construction information on how the pool will be erected.
- 6. Complete Application for Permit
- 7. A licensed Electrician must obtain an electrical permit and perform the electrical work for the pool. (The home owner may not do this work.)

In-ground Swimming Pools

1. Submit a boundary and topographical survey of your property (Note: A plan may be obtained from our

engineering department showing contours.)

- a Property lines
- b Location of all improvements (home, outbuildings and new pool, etc.)
- c Distance of new pool from property lines (must be a minimum 6')
- 2. Indicate location of power lines and distance to proposed pool (must be a minimum 10')
- 3. Pools shall have an alarmed door or self-locking gate
- 4. A fence must be installed around the pool. The minimum height shall be 48". If there is a fence around the entire property, all doors entering into the fenced-in area must be alarmed. Submit details of the proposed fence.
- 5. Submit construction drawings showing how the pool will be installed.
- 6. Complete Application for Permit
- 7. Show bonding of walkway (mesh or 6" slab with rebar)
- 8. Show anti-suction device for drain
- 9. A licensed Electrician must obtain an electrical permit and perform the electrical work for the pool. (The home owner may not do this work.)

Please be sure to obtain the proper permits and inspections so that you can ensure the safety and enjoyment of your pool. A copy of these requirements can be found on the City of Bethlehem's website page under the Code Enforcement link. ARTICLE TITLE: LEAD AND COPPER SAMPLING / WATER SERVICE LINE IDENTIFICATION

The Department of Water and Sewer Resources conducts sampling and analysis for lead and copper in our drinking water every 3 years in accordance with the US EPA Lead and Copper Rule. Levels of lead and copper in Bethlehem drinking water have consistently been below EPA action levels. The next round of lead and copper sampling will occur this summer. The City invites those residents who know or suspect they have a lead service line to consider participating in the sample program. It is completely voluntary. If interested please contact our Water Quality Bureau at 610-865-7144 or dbeatty@bethlehem-pa.gov.

In 2022, the City will start a project to replace lead service lines in its water system. We encourage all customers to help us identify if there is a lead service entering your home.

The customer-owned service line extends from the curb stop into your basement or crawl space. Identification of the type of material used for service lines and in-home plumbing can be done using a magnet and a penny. Your service line material should

be tested where the line first enters the home, which is typically in the basement before the water meter.

Once you identify your service line material, we ask that you contact the City so that we can update our data base and enter you in the program for line replacement if it is confirmed to be lead piping.

LIHWAP may be able to assist you with overdue water and wastewater bills.

What is LIHWAP?

The Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help lowincome families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant. You do not have to repay it.

To receive help...

- Apply starting January 4, 2022.
- You don't have to be on public assistance.
- You need to have an unpaid water bill.
- You can either rent or own your home

How does LIHWAP work?

LIHWAP Crisis grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one Crisis grant for your drinking water service and one Crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each.

Crisis situations include:

- Past-due water bills.
- Termination of utility service.
- Danger of having utility service terminated (received a notice that service will be shut off within the next 60 days).

How do I apply?

- Apply online at <u>www.compass.state.pa.us</u>.
- Request an application by calling the Statewide Customer Service Center at 877-395-8930 or call PA Relay at 711 for the hearing impaired.
- Applications are available at your local county assistance office.

To apply, you will need:

- · Names of people in your household;
- · Dates of birth for all household members;
- Social Security numbers for all household members;
- Proof of income for all household members; and
- A recent water bill.

Who is eligible?

- You may qualify for a LIHWAP grant if:
- You must have an overdue water bill that you are responsible for paying.
- Your household income meets the following income guidelines:

After your application is processed, you will receive a written notice that will tell you if you qualify. If eligible, it will tell you the amount of your grant.

The program started January 4, 2022 and runs through December 31, 2023.

2021 Earned Income Tax Returns are due on or before April 18, 2022.

2021 Business Privilege & Mercantile Tax Returns are due on or before **May 02, 2022**.

EARNED INCOME TAX & LOCAL SERVICES TAX

EARNED INCOME TAX (EIT) FILING

The Earned Income Tax (EIT) rate for the City of Bethlehem is a 1% income tax that is assessed on the gross earnings of residents and non-residents and net profits of residents. Just like Federal and State income taxes, EIT tax returns must be filed on-line https://efile.keystonecollects.com/#/login or by mail on or before April 18, 2022.

LOCAL SERVICES TAX (LST) FILING

The Local Services Tax (LST) rate for the City of Bethlehem is \$52 for per person who is employed or self-employed within the City of Bethlehem. Most employers withhold this tax and list it as the "LST TAX" on an employee's pay stub or W-2 form. Self-employed persons are responsible to file/pay the tax themselves quarterly.

BUSINESS PRIVILEGE & MERCANTILE TAX/LICENSING

BUSINESS PRIVILEGE AND MERCANTILE TAX/LICENSE FILING

A Business Privilege License (BPL) is required by all persons and/or businesses that engage in a business, profession, or other commercial activity within the City of Bethlehem. The BPL annual license fee is \$25.00. The license period runs from May 1st through April 30th of the following year.

The 2021 Business Privilege & Mercantile Tax Return is due on or before May 02, 2022.

The City of Bethlehem uses a third party servicer for collection of the BPL Licensing and collection of Business Privilege and Mercantile Tax. All BPL registrations, Business Privilege and Mercantile tax payments and returns for the City of Bethlehem are processed by:



Planting the Correct Size Tree; It is Important!

It can get overwhelming when trying to pick out a tree for your home, especially when so many factors come in to play. The caliper of the tree is one of the most important aspects when deciding which tree to buy. In the City of Bethlehem, street trees are required to be a minimum of two inches in caliper. Caliper is another term for the diameter of the tree, or the measurement around the trunk. There are a few reasons why this measurement is so important to follow when planting your tree. When doing a commercial or home landscape, you need a larger diameter tree so that it is not too small or weak. Without a larger caliper, the tree will snap or break under a small amount of pressure such as with the weight of snow. Smaller diameter trees like saplings are used for restoration projects or for farming where they will be raised and sold. Another important part about the diameter of a tree is that the larger it is, the shorter the time it will take to establish itself in the new location it was planted. For example, if you have a three inch in diameter tree, it will take about three years to establish itself. Having a two inch caliper minimum will help the tree be the most successful it can be with the money you put into it.



City of Bethlehem's Street Sweeping Schedule

April 1st - October 31st, Tuesday - Friday, 7:30 AM - 2:00 PM

The Department Of Public Works would like to make an announcement that the Bureau of Streets will begin its street sweeping program on April 1st through October 31st. During this time frame street sweeping activities will operate every Tuesday through Friday between 7:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., on the posted roads throughout the city limits. The regularly scheduled street sweeping routes that are main thoroughfares in the city are posted with "No Parking" signs alerting motorists of parking restrictions for a given day and time. Vehicles must be kept off these posted streets to allow for affective street cleaning.

The city is broken into 88 sweeping districts that are not posted and tries to deploy three sweepers each day to run through these areas. Roads that are under 12 feet wide do not get swept.



- Only ONE pass-thru will be made for each street.
- All items must be in either **BROWN PAPER BAGS**, rigid containers of less than 30 gallons or bundled with string (no tape or rope).
- No items over 4 inches in diameter or 4 feet in length.
- Any materials in plastic bags will not be picked up.

Materials accepted:

Leaves, small brush, hedge and shrub trimmings, Christmas trees free of tinsel, decorations and lights. Christmas trees must not be in plastic bags.

Materials NOT accepted:

Grass, hay, straw, tree stumps, root balls, soil, dirt, sod, mulch, bamboo, ornamental grass, acceptable materials not bagged, bundled or containerized or items exceeding length, width or weight requirements.

Bethlehem Food Co-Op

If you've passed by 250 E. Broad St. lately, you will hopefully have noticed a bevy of construction activity that in less than a year will bring a new community-owned, 'everyone welcome' grocery store to the neighborhood.

The Bethlehem Food Co-Op is a group of neighbors working to open the new store. In addition to the opportunity to shop for fresh, locally-produced food, it will provide good-paying jobs and a year-round sales outlet for local growers and producers.

Organizers also hope it will be a 'hub' in the community. "We're looking to bring a place to Bethlehem where everyone feels welcome to not

only shop, but to eat, participate in educational programs, and connect with their neighbors," said Carol Ritter, chair of the co-op's Board. A meeting space is on the list of features, including typical grocery store departments like produce, meat, dairy, bakery, deli, prepared foods, and health and household items.

The co-op's roots go back 10 years, when a group of friends recognized the need for better shopping options in Bethlehem's downtown area – the idea of a food co-op was launched, and it formally organized two years later.

Since then the group has grown to over 1100 member households and organizations/businesses that have purchased an equity share in the co-op. "When we say the co-op is community-owned, we really do mean that we, the owners, make the decisions and own the store," continued Ritter. "But everyone will be welcome to shop at the food co-op."

The nine-member Board leads an extensive team of volunteers but has also assembled a team of professionals with expertise in food co-op project management, store design, and store décor. They are working on creating a space for the co-op's store on the ground floor of a four-story, mixed-use building planned for the site. Peron Development and Boyle Construction are driving the project.

In addition to the revenue generated by members' one-time payments, the co-op works to secure grants, including a number of funding opportunities through the City of Bethlehem. Last summer, U.S. Rep. Susan Wild announced a \$2.9 million grant to the City on behalf of the co-op's construction and start-up costs.

Other costs – such as supporting the co-op's "Membership for All" scholarship program for new members, educational programs, and the initial purchase of the store inventory – will be covered by the group's Community Investment Fund initiative.

A key feature of that program is a "Naming Opportunities" project that allows an individual or business name to be displayed on part of the physical store, such as the produce department, kitchen space, or a bulk bin.

"Our food co-op is really by the community, for our community – we can't wait to get our doors open and shop alongside our neighbors for fresh, healthy, reasonably-priced locally-produced food," Ritter concluded.


